From the Pastor's Desk

Brilliant HopeBy Rev. Ricky Howell

I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope. Jeremiah 29:11 (Common English Bible)

We sure do love holidays, don't we? By the time you read this, we should be pretty close to Easter Sunday — meaning we're probably neck-deep in pastel colors, painted and plastic eggs, and all sorts of bunny and chick decorations. Stores (and potentially our homes) are most likely exploding with an abundance of seasonal décor and festivity. Now, I don't have a problem with all of this — I love me some Easter candy, after all — but I do find it strangely dissonant with the focus and mood we as a church are typically trying to establish at this time of year. After all, we're still in the season of Lent — an intentional time of self-reflection, fasting, and repentance as we prepare for Easter. How does this somber observance within the Church manage to coexist with the flamboyant celebration going on in the world around us?

As I reflected on that question, I was drawn back to a familiar passage: Jeremiah 29:11. There's a good chance many of us have read this verse ourselves or at least heard it quoted, most likely removed from its original context. To be fair, this is one of those verses that functions pretty well on its own, but when we consider its context it, takes on even greater meaning. Take a look at Jeremiah 29:10-14:

The Lord proclaims: When Babylon's seventy years are up, I will come and fulfill my gracious promise to bring you back to this place. 11 I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope. 12 When you call me and come and pray to me, I will listen to you. 13 When you search for me, yes, search for me with all your heart, you will find me. 14 I will be present for you, declares the Lord, and I will end your captivity. I will gather you from all the nations and places where I have scattered you, and I will bring you home after your long exile, declares the Lord.

Without getting too bogged down in history, this passage contains a message from God to the people of Israel (delivered through the prophet Jeremiah) during a time period referred to as "The Babylonian Exile." The Israelites had been conquered by the Babylonian Empire and deported – taken away from

their homes and separated from their communities. As you can imagine, it was a dark and incredibly discouraging time for them.

Throughout the rest of the book of Jeremiah (as well as in other books of the Bible), God calls upon the exiled Israelites to pray, repent, and reflect on the state of their hearts in relation to God. Sounds a bit like Lent, huh? Passages like Jeremiah 29:11, though, show us that God also repeatedly encouraged the people to cling to hope – a significant light in the darkness. We might think of it like enjoying bright decorations in the midst of a somber season, perhaps?

Do you see where I'm going with this? As odd as I sometimes feel preaching the seriousness of Lent while standing in the multi-colored shadow of the Easter Bunny, this year I'm challenging myself to see the brightness of the secular celebration of Easter as a reminder of the way God shines the light of hope into the darkness of our lives. Right now, we're rightfully focused on the difficult tasks of Lent – self-reflection, fasting, repentance – as a means of preparing our hearts and appreciating the sacrifice of Jesus on our behalf. But we'd also do well to remember that Lent doesn't end with Jesus' crucifixion and burial; it ends with Jesus' resurrection and God's triumph over sin and death. May we never forget that although we're currently living in a somber season of darkness, we still serve a God of brilliant hope.



Stained-Glass Windows

The story of stained-glass windows goes back to the Middle Ages when people learned the stories of the Bible by looking at the beautiful stained-glass windows in cathedrals and churches. Our church is no exception. In 1938, when the new church was built after the old church burned down from being struck by lightning, Miss Louise Simpson, granddaughter of Major R.F. Simpson, donated a stained window for the narthex of the church facing Broad Street.

In 1988, the present sanctuary was built in the location where the old 1938 sanctuary previously stood. The committee that was charged to build the new sanctuary carried on the tradition of stained-glass windows.

The stained-glass windows in the sanctuary tell the stories of Jesus's life. The first one left of the pulpit is about the birth of Jesus. The second window is about the baptism of Jesus by John the Baptist with the Dove coming down. The last one on that side is Jesus healing the sick child.

On the right side of the sanctuary, the first window is Jesus praying in the olive grove called Gethsemane. The second window shows the Crucifixion of Jesus. The third and last window is the Transfiguration of Jesus going up into heaven.

When the new sanctuary was built, the old stained-glass window was placed in the back of the balcony, which is the front of the church. This window tells the story of Jesus talking to the little children. Also, in each of the front two rooms off the narthex are windows of stained glass. These windows are colorful but without a story.

When the construction of the new sanctuary was started, members donated money for the windows in memory of a loved one. On the left wall of the narthex are three brass plaques telling who donated the windows, the pews, and the furnishings of the altar.

Determining how PUMC should pursue discussions and decisions regarding the UMC has been challenging and frustrating. After conversations with several people, I decided to pursue discussion with the Pastor to begin to form a team to lead efforts to collect information that could facilitate the process. An ad hoc team has been developed to investigate fact-finding and sharing. In a few minutes, I will share with you the team composition and the charge to them. Efforts were made to include persons from all age levels and genders. Persons asked to be on this team were not chosen for a specific role they have in the Church nor a role on the Council of Stewards. These individuals do not represent a specific group in the church and are not soliciting information and viewpoints from church members. Their charge is to find information to share from available resources so that informed decisions can be made. I know that some individuals may feel that they should be on the team but we decided to keep the number rather small to facilitate group meetings. Persons were not solicitated because of their respective views regarding the UMC deliberations and are charged to not interject personal bias into the fact-finding process. Deliberate efforts were made to include persons with technology skills to locate information on various websites (such as the SC UMC website and various church websites that have already gone through this process) and be able to succinctly communicate such information to church members. Much of this information will be sent via emails, videos, document and in meetings. This information will lead to further discussions and meetings, as outlined in the process.

While ordering flowers to be placed on the cross we display in front of the church on Easter morning, I thought about how Butch built that cross and made it magically appear to be adorned. Then it would disappear until next Easter. Remember those who have left their mark here.

P.E.E.P.S. recognition, graduation recognition, and Mother's Day are just around the corner. The Worship Committee looks forward to celebrating with you.

"The flowering of the cross has been traced back to the 6th century. It is an especially striking and beautiful way to symbolize the new life that emerges from Jesus' death on Good Friday. Traditionally before the Easter Sunday service, the cross is covered with real flowers and the top draped in white. The entire cross is covered with flowers and is placed prominently at the front of the church to symbolize the new life in our risen Lord to all the worshippers present on Easter Sunday morning. The contrast between the starkly bare cross that worshippers have seen for 40 days and the living flower cross of Easter Sunday dramatically and visually represents the new life that we are celebrating after witnessing the very instrument of death and endings transformed by Christ's rising.

What are the different parts of a United Methodist Church Sanctuary?

Sanctuary: This is the main worship space where the congregation gathers for worship services.

Narthex: This is the entryway or lobby of the church where people can gather before and after services.

Altar: This is a raised platform or table where the communion elements are placed during the service, and where the pastor may also deliver the message.

Pulpit: This is a raised platform or lectern where the pastor delivers the sermon or message.

Lectern: This is a reading stand or podium from which scripture readings and other parts of the service are read.

Chancel: This is the area of the sanctuary located at the front, near the altar and pulpit, where the choir and other leaders may sit or stand during the service.

Nave: This is the main area of the sanctuary where the congregation sits during the service.

Aisle: This is the pathway that leads from the entrance to the front of the sanctuary, separating the pews or chairs where the congregation sits.

Chancel rail: This is a low railing that separates the chancel area from the nave.

Baptismal Font: This is a basin used for baptisms, usually located near the entrance or front of the sanctuary.

Candles: These are used for symbolic purposes during the service, such as lighting the Advent wreath.


Cross: This is a symbol of the Christian faith, often displayed prominently in the sanctuary, such as on the altar or behind the pulpit.







Methodist Liturgical Colors / Parament Colors By Becky Hopkins

"The Christian year has two cycles: the Christmas Cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) and the Easter Cycle (Lent-Easter-Pentecost). Within each cycle are a preparatory season symbolized by the color purple and a festival season symbolized by the color white. After each cycle, there is an ordinary time of growth symbolized by the color green. Thus, there is a sequence of seasons using purple, white, and green in that order twice each year." (The United Methodist Book of Worship)



- Purple, representing both royalty and penitence, is traditionally used during Advent and Lent.
- **Blue** symbolizes hope and may also be used during **Advent**.
- White and Gold are used at Christmas and Easter to symbolize joy and festivities.
- Red symbolizes the color of fire to represent the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost and times when the
 work of the Holy Spirit is emphasized. During Holy Week it represents the blood of Christ. Red is also
 used for ordinations, church anniversaries, and civil observances such as Memorial
 Day and Thanksgiving.
- **Green** represents growth and is used during **Ordinary Time** (the season after Epiphany and the season after Pentecost.)
- White is used for weddings and funerals.



In the freezer is a pan with ice in the bottom that can be used for yogurt and cheese sticks. Creamer is on the top shelf in the refrigerator; if you will add a layer of ice under the grid, this will keep it insulated.

Any leftovers that will not last until the next Sunday, please take with you. Please empty and wash the water container and coffee pot. Lemonade can go back in the refrigerator.

All washed dishes can be left in the drying rack, and I will put them up during the week.


