

From the Pastor's Desk

Discernment

Cats are funny animals. They tend to go where they want, when they want to- and that especially includes sleeping in some strange locations. It's become a bit of a game for me when I wake up in the morning or come home from being out of the house; I wonder, "where will I find the cats sleeping this time?" Maybe it'll be on top of the laundry hamper, or possibly under the couch, or even wedged inside of a drawer that one of the kids forgot to close. Whatever the case, I enjoy the act of searching for and discovering our cats in unexpected places.

On Tuesday, September 5th the Pendleton United Methodist Church Council of Stewards voted to officially enter the Discernment Process to further discuss and decide whether or not our church should separate from the United Methodist denomination. At the end of this period of discernment, all of our church members will be given the opportunity to vote on whether they want us to stay United Methodist or not. Undoubtedly, we will all spend a lot of time in prayer over this important decision. As such, I think its worth offering up a suggestion as to one way I think we should be praying.

Now, we might be of the mind that "discernment" means trying to figure out where God is in all of this-much like my search for my cats that I mentioned earlier. However, I think that's not necessarily the correct question. After all, God shows up in all sorts of expected and unexpected places- and there's no doubt in my mind that God is present and at work WITHIN the United Methodist Church and that God is also present and at work OUTSIDE of the United Methodist Church. In other words, leaving or staying isn't going to help us better discover God. The more helpful question, as I see it, is "what will allow us to best fulfill our mission of

'knowing God [Christ] and making God [Christ] known?'" In other words, can we best fulfill our mission as part of the United Methodist Church or as separate from the United Methodist Church?

By this time, you are most likely aware that there are some among us who believe that leaving the United Methodist Church is the best option. They have raised valid reasons for why we might distrust United Methodist leaders, have cited verified instances where our system has failed to uphold its own rules, and can point to credible accounts of some pastors and churches who have deviated from traditionally accepted Christian theology and teachings. I don't disagree with these persons that the United Methodist Church has some serious issues- just as all manmade institutions do- and that those who are concerned are justified in their misgivings.

Conversely, there are some among us who believe that remaining part of the United Methodist Church is the best option. They see value in United Methodist ministries to youth, children, and college students such as Salkehatchie, Epworth Children's Home, and the Clemson Wesley Foundation. These persons appreciate our connection to other United Methodist Churches and the larger global impact we have through disaster response and relief agencies such as the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM). And they appreciate the added security and resources provided by our Conference, such as the guaranteed appointment of a pastor and grant funding for new ministry initiatives. While we would certainly be able to continue meaningful and valid ministry apart from the UMC, there are definitely benefits to our current relationship with the denomination.

With all of that considered, though, this decision will ultimately rest on you- the individual church members of PUMC. By the time you read this, we will be in the midst of "discerning" together, but when it comes time to vote you will each have to decide what YOU think is best for our church. God isn't hard to find; God is present within the United Methodist Church and God is present outside of the United Methodist Church, and no matter what happens God will continue to be present with us. Again, the more helpful question is, "will we best be able to fulfill our mission to 'know Christ and make Christ known' as part of the United Methodist Church or apart from it?" I hope you will spend plenty of time in prayer over this matter, and- as always- I am available should you wish to discuss or even pray together. Thank you for being a vital part of our church family.

Mission Support Needed

Good day, Church Family. I am asking for your help. For many years now, I have been involved in going on mission to Cuba. My devotion to this mission began with my brother 20-plus years ago. The dates for this year are October 27- November 7. Here is a snapshot of the mission.

What: Mission to Cuba as part of a construction mission team that helps to build or repair places of worship. The team will help with whatever project is assigned by the bishop and cabinet of the Cuba Methodist Church. There is a long history of strong "hands-on" mission efforts to one of our most intriguing international neighbors. Cuba is one of the many countries where professing Christians are still often persecuted: punished by losing jobs or loss of food vouchers, and loss of certain privileges.

This year we will be working through the Cuba Connection Ministries, centered in Jovellanos, Matanzas, Cuba. We will be repairing/constructing at the Iglesia de Olam, in the city of Matanzas, with Pastor Eleazar Santiago. Matanzas is on the north shore of Cuba, several miles east of Havana.

We also hope to reach others for Christ in the community with the distribution of rice and beans to the elderly and those in need.

In addition, we will work with a local church with a VBS for their outreach ministry to the disabled. Of course, all service/project arrangements are subject to change, based on the immediate needs of the churches in the area.

Needed: Construction materials are very hard to come by and very expensive in Cuba. They recycle everything possible. They even straighten used nails. Cubans have very little money; salaries are extremely low. Money donations are used to buy materials and tools to take with us and/or to purchase expensive items in Cuba. This year we will be concentrating on repairs and providing the church with funds to feed the people.

Common medical supplies and personal items are also hard to acquire. Donations of all types of OTC medicines such as all vitamins, cold medicines, aspirin, IBP, and stomach remedies (not gel capsules of any kind) are very much needed.

Money donations are greatly appreciated to help purchase items for the church and its members. This includes hymnals, Sunday School materials, church furniture, and equipment. Monetary donations from PUMC, in the past, were enough to purchase, in Cuba, the altar, lighting, and several pews for the new church we helped to build. This year, our Christian brothers and sisters are facing the inability to buy adequate food for their families.

I appreciate any donation made for the Cuban mission. Money donations can be given to the church with the memo line saying "Mullikin-Cuba". The church has an account for these donations, and you will be given a tax credit for the donation. Items donated can be left at the church and I will pick them up from there. Donations should be turned in by October 25.

We know Christ; let's help make Christ known.

Way Forward Committee Update

Since the Way Forward Committee was formed the committee has been educating the church on the state of the United Methodist Church per the goals clearly stated on the Pendleton United Methodist Website so that the church can make an informed decision on disaffiliation/separation from the United Methodist Church. The goal of The PUMC Path Forward Committee as stated on the website was to provide members information that will bring more clarity to all sides of the issue. Additionally, we will provide a more comprehensive evaluation of the cost of disaffiliation and alternative strategies going forward.

Now that the Council Of Stewards has voted to enter the Discernment Period, the Way Forward Committee will be transitioning it's efforts to fulfilling a new 5 page checklist of items received from the SC UMC Trustees. This is another revision to the Checklist for Closure and Separation in 2024. This checklist is more detailed than the 2023 version and has more specific due dates that require earlier submissions. The appraisal of each church is due by December 1st. The Conference Treasurer writes: "The first item in the checklist states that a church may vote using a self-prepared estimate. And, it recommended that the estimate be a range to allow for any discrepancies between their estimate and the final separation fee. This is to allow a church to vote without waiting for me to give them an amount for the separation fee." Also included in the December deadline are copies of all deeds and a very detailed report of insurance coverages dating back to 1996; this information must be prepared by an insurance professional. We will be asking our current insurance company to help with providing this material. The church is required to vote no later than March 1.

In a recent meeting with the District Superintendent, the Chairperson for The Council Of Stewards was informed that Pendleton United Methodist Church should hire an attorney to help the committee with filing the information required in the new Checklist. Since a number of the items have a deadline of December 1, 2023, the Co-Chairs of the Committee interviewed an attorney who has helped other churches with this process. The Co-Chairs of the Way Forward Committee requested permission of the Council of Stewards meeting on September 26 to sign the engagement letter with this attorney; permission was unanimously granted. The attorney's name is Mark Meglic and the engagement letter has been signed and dated by the Chair of the Trustee, Bryan Greene, and Evan Link, Trustees. This contract has been returned to the Attorney.

Please be aware that the Way Forward Committee will be working with other Committees in our Church to meet the checklist requirements.

In addition, the question that the Way Forward Committee has been asked repeatedly is if the church votes to disaffiliate/separate from the United Methodist Church, what new denomination would Pendleton United Methodist Church be affiliated with as we go forward or would Pendleton United Church remain independent. As stated above, the Way Forward Committee will be very busy fulfilling the date sensitive obligations to the United Methodist Annual Conference Trustees. It would not be fair to the congregation to ask for a vote on disaffiliation/separation without providing information on next steps for Pendleton United Methodist Church.

The Way Forward Committee informed the Council of Stewards that, in keeping with the goal of providing information on alternative strategies, a new sub-committee of the Way Forward Committee called Making A Way has been formed. The committee members will be led by Bryan Green as the Chairperson. Members of this committee are Frank Crenshaw, Laurie Havice, Ivy Steepy, Sarah Burns, Jennifer Walker and Tyler Williams. The Council of Stewards unanimously approved this sub-committee. The new sub-committee is charged with several goals:

- 1. Explore various options in the event that disaffiliation becomes a reality.
- 2. Provide information to inform the church members about various options available to the church.
- 3. Lead a church meeting to discuss these options.
- 4. Forward one option as a recommendation to the Council of Stewards.
