

Umpires and Idols By Rev. Ricky Howell

"I was wrong." When was the last time you were willing to honestly say those words out loud to another person? It's such a short phrase- only 3 simple words- yet expressing that sentiment can prove to be a significant challenge for many of us. After all, admitting our own limitations and mistakes requires a measure of humility, self-awareness, and maturity that might not come naturally.

I don't think I'll ever forget a time during my childhood when I was forced into learning such humility. Believe it or not, I played baseball for a few years while I was in elementary school. Now, I wasn't much of a batter, and I only made a decent catcher and outfielder, but I was a fast runner and good at stealing bases. One game, I found myself on first base and the base coach directed me to steal second. I took off running, did my best slide, and then popped back up on the base- confident that I'd beaten the throw to tag me out. Unfortunately, the umpire disagreed with me. To make matters worse, before I could catch myself, I angrily told the umpire how I felt about his call. And so, not only did I find myself tagged out, I also got ejected from the game. Worse yet, my dad- who also happened to be one of my coaches- wasn't content to just let me find a spot on the bleachers and wallow in self-pity. Instead, he asked for a time-out so that I could apologize to the umpire in front of everyone. Whether I wanted to or not, that day I learned that sometimes I have to be willing to admit, "I was wrong."

While baseball wasn't a thing in Paul's day, he did still do his share of coaching. In 1 Corinthians 8:1-3 (NLT), we read these words of instruction that Paul offered to the church in Corinth:

From the Pastor's Desk (continued)

Now regarding your question about food that has been offered to idols. Yes, we know that "we all have knowledge" about this issue. But while knowledge makes us feel important, it is love that strenathens the church. 2 Anyone who claims to know all the answers doesn't really know very much. 3 But the person who loves God is the one whom God recognizes.

To provide some context, the Corinthian church was caught up in a debate over eating food that had been sacrificed to idols. Since the church contained new believers from a variety of backgrounds and faith traditions, there were naturally differences of opinion; some members of the church were strongly opposed to the practice while others had no issue with it. Evidently, the situation had become tense and divisive, necessitating an intervention from Paul to prevent the church from imploding. His solution? Try to prevent the members from "sinning against each other" by encouraging them to humbly admit their own limitations and recommit themselves to loving each other. In other words, Paul wanted the church members to realize that living out love was more important than proving themselves correct.

It's no secret that the past year or so has felt particularly tense and conflicted at PUMC. We have been in the midst of our own time of debate and division over whether or not our church should officially "separate" and leave our denomination. During this time, some of us have remained quiet and detached, some have attempted to stay involved without getting sucked into the drama, and others have chosen to express their opinions openly and even forcefully. Understandably, some of us have strong feelings on the subject, but we may not have always expressed those feelings in a way that has been loving and respectful of each other. Regardless of how we've approached the situation, it's been difficult for all of us.

In a few short days, our church will finally vote on this matter, and we'll all begin the difficult task of determining what comes next. Depending on how things go, some of us may feel affirmed in our convictions while others may feel discouraged over things not going as we wanted. Some of us may even feel the need to begin searching for another church to call home. Whatever the case, my hope and prayer for all of us is that we'll be willing to do what it takes to express love to each other and potentially salvage damaged relationships. For as Paul reminds us, "while knowledge makes us feel important, it is love that strengthens the church."



Our committee meets at various times to continually seek to reach out to church members as well as those who are unchurched.

Helping Hands Cindi Long

We meet on the last Wednesday of each month at local restaurants at 1:00 pm. Dates and locations are posted in the bulletin each month. We would love to see more ladies join us. This is a time of fellowship and food!

Trustees have maintained various church property issues, such as replacing several HVAC units, replacing roofing, addressing gutter problems, bathroom plumbing issues, etc. The Trustees and the Finance Committee are actively involved with the Way Forward Committee.

The Finance Committee keeps the Church current with weekly budget reports in the bulletin each week and has set the annual budget for 2024.

All college and high school graduates were recognized with presentation of Bibles and were highlighted in one of the Newsletters.

The Communications Committee diligently prepares quarterly newsletters that highlight activities, articles, calendar birthdays, and anniversaries. This publication has been a great asset to keeping our membership informed and highlights new members. This year one edition highlighted our church staff. The Church Historian includes an article in each Newsletter that gives brief snapshots of historical aspects of PUMC. Our recently added choir and congregational pianist was highlighted when he and his wife joined. The Church has also purchased a Yamaha Digital Baby Grand piano that all of us are enjoying, especially 9-year old Creighton Cahaly with the special music he provides.

Outreach has been involved in many activities, including providing meals for church families with prolonged illness and/or death. They also remember persons on birthdays and anniversaries. Homecoming celebration was held last November with Rev. Steve Pearson, who grew up at PUMC bringing the morning message; a bountiful meal followed the worship service. Outreach is also exploring the possibility of compiling a Church cookbook and adding another missionary family to our support list. Also included in outreach is a bereavement support group and a Prayer Shawl Ministry. Mary Ellen Mullikin made her annual mission trip to Cuba in memory of her brother.

Along these same lines, Congregational Life has provided meals or receptions for several families who have lost loved ones this year. They coordinated our annual picnic at the park, the Merry Thanksmas meal, and participated in the community Lenten luncheons.

Worship works to ensure that our services are appropriate for each event and/or season. They purchased several flower arrangements that may be used when no one has signed up to have flowers in the sanctuary. They provided bouquets for PEEPS staff at their service of recognition and also were responsible for the Easter cross in front of the Church. They held a Chrismon workshop to add additional ones to the larger tree. They also added 2 Christmas trees to the social hall for the early service.

The Cemetery Committee sent letters to families of members interred to request donations for upkeep.

The Stewardship Committee has been diligent in reducing the construction debt. Two activities were selling PUMC Christmas cards and holding a Shrove Pancake supper.

An additional program housed at PUMC is the Christian Learning Center for around 100 seventh and eighth grade students from the middle school. This program reports that several students accepted Jesus and some students also led their family to Christ.

PUMC Council of Stewards Report Charge Conference For November 1, 2022 thru November 5, 2023 Arlene Privette

This year has been quite busy at PUMC. We started the year with a planning session in February to prepare us for the coming year. I want to highlight activities. This list is quite lengthy, and I apologize for any omissions.

Probably the biggest event this year is the ongoing process of discernment and possible separation from the SCUMC. The COS voted to enter discernment on September 5 and are awaiting a Church Conference in January 2024. The appraisal has been completed, and an attorney has been hired to facilitate discussions. Updates of this Committee have been included in each Newsletter. A Moving Forward Subcommittee is working to provide information regarding various options available should the Church vote to separate.

Our Children's Ministry is always busy. Sunday School sessions teach Bible lessons using a new interactive TV and iPad. Club 22:6 meets on Sunday evenings. Various activities include the Easter egg hunt and Trunk or Treat held on the town square, making Valentines for shut-ins and cards for the weekend backpacks as well as Christmas caroling. They also had Vacation Bible School conducted on the town square to not coincide with Salkehatchie schedule, with 30-35 in attendance. The children wrote letters telling what they felt was the true meaning of Christmas; these letters were included in the food bags distributed with Magi food. The Church has also had a return of acolytes at the 11:00 service with the children's participation. Children led one service in August and had the blessings of the backpacks.

The Youth have an active Sunday School Class and UMYF which meets weekly with 15-18 in attendance. They took a winter/spring weekend trip with self-led worship and fellowship throughout the weekend. This group also enjoys helping the UMM with their annual BBQ and had a lock-in the Friday night prior. After a 3-year hiatus, 2023 Salkehatchie was a tremendous success with a smaller group than formerly. This smaller number enabled them to remain at the church for their services and spending the nights. They repaired three houses, with one house repair led by a group of former PUMC youth. Matthew does an outstanding job of coordinating this program with many volunteers.


We have Sunday School activities with a group of 11-14 college age students meeting regularly.

One our most involved community outreach is PEEPS, with both morning and after school sessions at full capacity. PEEPS was honored at one of our Sunday morning worship services followed by lunch. They completed the annual CPR training and had the Pendleton Fire Department provide input pertaining to safety. They had a Donuts for Dads, a St. Patrick celebration, a Thanksgiving feast and parade, and an Art Day conducted by a local artist. They consistently maintain Safe Sanctuary Policies and background checks.

Another community outreach involvement is the Magi program that includes about 15 other churches. Last Christmas, 843 gifts were provided to 281 children and almost 5,000 pounds of food were given to 101 families. Magi also provides three summer food distributions. PUMC actively contributes to Clemson Community Care to provide both funds and food.

The UMM meet every other month and support various community groups, most notably the Wilderness Boys Camp. They are also compiling a grid of the plots at Asbury Cemetery.

The Adult Ministries organizes First Thursday luncheons and Second Thursday Supper Club at various restaurants in the area, with attendance ranging from 15-35 each month.
