

Concerning Pastor Ricky's Renewal Leave

By the time these words are printed, I will have officially begun my period of "renewal leave" and effectively ended my time as your pastor. As such leave is not a common occurrence, I understand that there may be some confusion. In order to address the common questions and concerns that have been raised related to this issue, I have included a series of Frequently Asked Questions below.

What is a Renewal Leave?

According to ¶ 350 of The Book of Discipline, Continuing Education and Spiritual Growth

- 1. Throughout their careers, clergy shall engage in continuing education for ministry, professional development, and spiritual formation and growth in order to lead the church in fulfilling the mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ. This shall include carefully developed personal programs of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational and spiritual growth activities. These practices embody the Wesleyan emphasis on lifelong growth in faith, fostered by personal spiritual practices and participation in covenant communities. Each annual conference, through the chairs of the Clergy Orders and Fellowship or other leaders designated by the bishop, shall provide spiritual enrichment opportunities and covenant groups for deacons, elders, and local pastors.
- 2. A clergy member's continuing education and spiritual growth program shall include professional formation leaves at least one week each year and may include at least one month during one year of every quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part

of the ministers' vacations and shall be planned in consultation with their charges or other agencies to which they are appointed as well as the bishop, district superintendent, and annual conference continuing education committee.

3. A clergy member may request a formational and spiritual growth leave of up to six months while continuing to hold an appointment in the local church. Such leaves are available to clergy members who have held full-time appointments for at least six years. Such a leave shall be with the approval of the committee on pastor-parish relations, the church council, and the district superintendent. Annual conferences are encouraged to assist with pulpit supply and other temporary support for such leaves.

Note: Spiritual Renewal Leave is NOT an extended vacation. It is a period of study and preparation for a new season of ministry.

Why is Pastor Ricky taking Renewal Leave?

I have NOT been asked to leave early, nor am I being "forced out," nor am I "abandoning the church." Rather, I requested this leave because I feel that it is in the best interest of the church as well as my family for us to part ways earlier than anticipated. My hope is that this will allow all of us to go ahead and start moving forward, begin healing, and refocus on what we are called to do.

When is Pastor Ricky's Renewal Leave?

My leave will begin on Monday, April 1st and continue through the end of June – the conclusion of my appointment to Pendleton United Methodist Church.

Who approved Pastor Ricky's Renewal Leave?

As is stated in the paragraph from the Discipline included above, such leave requests require approval by the church Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), Church Council (Council of Stewards), and the District Superintendent. In this case, our District Superintendent chose to seek additional approval from the Bishop and Cabinet (other District Superintendents). Nonetheless, all of these groups supported my leave request.

How will ministry needs be covered during Pastor Ricky's leave?

A pastor or pastors will be assigned by the District Superintendent to preach at both worship services on Sundays and to cover emergency pastoral care needs. This pastor (or pastors) will be paid by the Conference and will not be expected to handle administrative matters or to attend programs and events.

Starting Fresh and Debt-Free:

The Council of Stewards has asked me to help lead the way to our fresh start as Pendleton Methodist Church DEBT-FREE!! I hope you will join me because it is my belief that WE CAN DO THIS!

Why do I believe this? In exactly 3 years, we have paid \$610,000 toward our construction loan!! hank you for your generosity; now let us put just a little more effort to see this through! Please be in thoughtful prayer over what God wants you to give...and please remember that none of the funds you contribute go to the United Methodist Church. Our financial settlement with UMC was decided and appropriated on December 31, 2023!

As a fundraiser to help us get to this debt-free place, we are having a Pancake Supper on Wednesday, May 15th at 6:00 PM. We will have freshly made pancakes and sausage with juice and coffee. The tickets will be \$10, and we look forward to a great night of fellowship with an auction of great items you donate!! We are asking you to drop off items you no longer need or want to the church office. It is my guess someone else would love to have it!

Please continue to pray for the love of Christ to shine through our church into the Pendleton and surrounding communities!

History of BBQ Pits By Martha Jeffries

When Methodists get together to celebrate, you know there will always be food. One of our favorite meals is a BBQ meal. This story goes back several decades ago.

As part of a 4th of July celebration, Butch Kennedy and Charles Vic Privette thought an old-fashioned Pig Picking would be a part of the celebration. For the first roast, a pit was dug on the church grounds with a grill over the top. The pig was bought from Clemson University and put on the grill. The men and boys took turns turning the pig. After a couple of years, Butch brought in a portable cooker and used his horse trailer to store the wood. Some stayed all night to keep watch.

This went on for several years until a permanent grill large enough for 5 pigs with a cover and wood storage was built. Thus this shed has been used for many years. Just recently was found a list of the initials of the builders on a beam of the shed. You can see the initials in the photo: BB (Benjie Black), CVP (Charles Vic Privette), BK (Butch Kennedy), DS (Dale Shaw), CP (Charlesy Privette), GJ (Gary Jeffries), and BG (Bryon Guffee).

Pick'n Time by April Haynes From Volume 2 Issue 4 – October – December 2022

At a casual glance, the structure in the back corner of the parking lot across from the playground looks more like a storage shed than its actual intended use as a BBQ pit. Over the years, BBQ fundraisers have served to support various outreach missions. The history of BBQ fundraising at PUMC goes back many decades to when what is currently known as the gym was originally built as a Social Hall. During that time, PUMC had an annual community-wide 4th of July celebration with a patriotic service led by Ray Smith. In working to increase attendance, Butch Kennedy and Charles Privette thought that it would be a good idea to add a meal with a vinegar-based BBQ "pig pick'n" to the event.

Based on their low country upbringing, it was decided to cook onsite since cooking a whole hog is an overnight process. Butch brought in a portable cooker and set it up near the Social Hall using a horse trailer as storage for the wood and other supplies while he and Charlie tended to the cooking process. It was served in true whole hog style for multiple years until it was determined that it would be better to have the meat in trays for serving. After the town of Pendleton started the Independence Day Celebrations at Veteran's Park, people started to only come to eat and not stay for the patriotic service. At that point, since the PUMC BBQ was so well known, it was decided that it would become an annual missions outreach fundraiser for the Methodist Men. Butch and Charlie led the team that built the BBQ pit area to cook up to five hogs at a time and continued to head up the hog cooking for the fundraiser. In recent years, the multi-decade fundraiser changed format, and the BBQ pit area isn't fully utilized like it once was.

Facility use may change over time, but the focus on PUMC outreach missions remains constant. If you are interested in participating with our outreach ministries, there are numerous "pick'n" opportunities throughout the year with all levels of involvement. "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace." (1 Peter 4:10)

This report is provided as an update to the one provided in the First Quarter Newsletter. The PUMC vote to separate from the United Methodist Church was held on January 21. The following Sunday, January 28, the Way Forward Committee provided a presentation recommending that the Church become part of the Global Methodist Church. Rev. Erik Grayson Elder for the Upstate GMC, presented an overview of the GMC, with guestions and comments received; this discussion was very informative. Since that time, a vote was taken of members on February 25 as to whether the new entity will be Pendleton Methodist Church (PMC) and whether the entity will become part of the Global Methodist Church (GMC); of 114 votes cast, 112 agreed to become PMC and 110 agreed to become part of the GMC.

The Way Forward and Moving Forward Committees then joined together to facilitate transitioning to becoming Pendleton Methodist Church, effective July 1, 2024. Several processes had to be completed prior to the end of 2023, including an appraisal of all property, locating deeds for each parcel of land, and validating adequate insurance coverage for all properties and the parsonage family. Documentation was sent to the SC UMC that will transfer all properties to Pendleton Methodist Church on July 1, 2024. Financial statements from the Church were submitted along with bank reconciliations for December 2023 and January 2024. Original signed documents were submitted showing the result of the required 2/3 majority vote taken at the Church Conference regarding separation from the SC UMC.

On April 30, 2024, the SC UMC Conference Trustees will provide to the Church those payment amounts required separation; these funds will be sent to an escrow account no later than May 31. Digital copies of membership rolls/records, funerals, baptisms, and weddings must be submitted by April 30, along with digital copies of Council meeting minutes and historical and current property records send to the Conference Archivist. Several other agreements will be submitted, and the Annual Conference vote will when Conference convenes June 9 – 12.

The Way Forward Committee was advised by Rev. Grayson to approve a Transitional Board of Directors for PMC which will work alongside the Council of Stewards of PUMC. The Council of Stewards approved this Transitional Board at a Called Meeting on March 17. Members of this Board are Craig Cahaly, Howard Corbett, Russell Guffee, Laurie Havice, Arlene Privette, and Josh Runion. Since the process of selecting clergy within the GMC differs from the traditional UMC process, this Board will work with Rev. Grayson to interview and select the clergy for PMC, to begin July 1. Please be in prayer for our Church and the ministers involved in this process. You will receive information regarding this selection in a timely manner. This Board also will be working to establish a transitional structure for the new entity with identification of needed committees/teams and members. Individual church members will be asked to complete a survey of gifts, talents, and interests so that each team will reflect those persons who have the desire and ability to work on that team. Also, be in prayer regarding how you may be able and willing to serve our Church.

You have previously been provided information relative to the financial obligations of this separation, with the amount of our buyout from the UMC being roughly \$260,000. The Board of Trustees, Finance Committee, and Council of Stewards have approved the selling of our parsonage. Discussions have been underway with People's Bank to obtain a loan for the separation amount. When the parsonage sells, that money will be used to repay the loan, leaving us with only a small amount remaining on our current construction loan which we hope will be paid off prior to July 1.

This process has been arduous and has involved full cooperation from the entire Church. All those involved appreciate the many ways in which members have stepped up to the plate and assisted with decisions. Please continue to pray that our Church will continue to be a beacon of God's light in this wonderful community.

- We did another acolyte training in March for anyone unable to attend the previous training.


- We hosted our annual Community Easter Egg hunt on the Square and had a large attendance. Thank you to those who donated candy!
